WHEREAS: The Lecompton Reenactors presented a dialogue on the slavery issue, featuring James Lane, John Brown, Frederick Douglas.

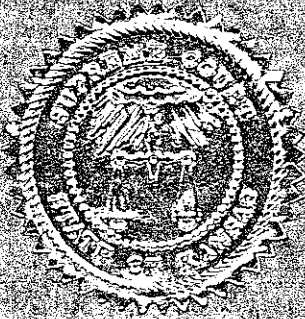
WHEREAS: Members of the Lecompton Historical Society hosted a "favorite dish" luncheon for the Court.
